

### 1 // CENTRAL STATION

Team CS (2006-2012)

The Central Station will be undergoing a radical metamorphosis, with work scheduled to continue through 2012. The arrival of the international high-speed line (HSL), the introduction of a regional Randstad rail line and a completely revamped station building will make the station area an attractive and dynamic public transport hub, acting as the international gateway to the centre of Rotterdam. The design of the new Central Station is the work of Team CS, comprising three firms of architects - Benthem Crouwel, Meyer & Van Schooten and West 8.

### 2 // NATIONALE NEDERLANDEN

Abe Bonnema (1986-1991)

The higher of the two prominent, reflective towers stands at a little over 151 metres. This impressive height makes this Nationale Nederlanden office building the tallest of its kind in the Netherlands.

### 3 // GROOTHANDELSGEBOUW

H.A. Maaskant and W. van Tijen (1947-1953)

A good example of early 1950s reconstruction. After World War II, firms which had previously been scattered throughout the city centre set up business here. 220 metres long and 85 metres wide, it was the largest multi-tenant building in Europe at the time. An extremely ingenious network of pathways intersecting the building - about 1.5 kilometres in total - facilitate loading and unloading. Nearly 130 businesses and shops are currently housed in this structure. The Groothandelsgebouw was recently designated a listed building.

**TIP** Grand café and restaurant Engels has been a household name in Rotterdam for over 100 years. It is also home to the VVV Rotterdam Info Café, where you can find tourist information on Rotterdam while enjoying a delicious lunch or cup of coffee.

### 4 // CONCERT AND CONFERENCE CENTRE DE DOELEN

R.H. Fledderus (1955-1966) / Jan Hoogstad (2000)

Named after the former music centre that was destroyed during the bombing of May 1940. In 2000, new conference facilities were built on the roof and above the old inner courtyard. Symphonic concerts (e.g. from the Rotterdam Philharmonic Orchestra) are held regularly in the main auditorium and its smaller counterpart, but De Doelen also presents world music and children's concerts.

**TIP** Come soak up the atmosphere during a great jazz concert in the Doelencafé on a Sunday afternoon (free admission).

### 5 // MILLENNIUM TOWER

Web Zerafa Menkes Housden (2000)

The Millennium Tower houses such prestigious establishments as the Westin Hotel, which occupies the first 14 floors of the 131-metre skyscraper. The Westin is one of the most modern and luxurious hotels in the city.

### 6 // PLAZA

Ellerman, Lucas, Van Vugt (1984-1992)

Multifunctional building with office space, a residential tower, a multi-storey car park, a shopping centre and a casino. The golden-coloured image of Flora above the entrance was created by British artist Theo Crosby.

### 7 // KRUISKADE

This shopping street boasts find a wide variety of shops, restaurants and clubs, including the 'master of the made-to-measure suit' Oger, Akkerman's inspiring optics, the Cartier jewellery house and trendy shoe shop Shoebaloo. For a night on the town, check out Off\_Corso or the Thalia Lounge.

### 8 // SCHOUWBURGPLEIN

Adriaan Geuze (1992-1997)

Surrounded by De Doelen, the Rotterdam Schouwburg and Pathé cinema, the Schouwburgplein is an unorthodox variation on the classical square. This light metal construction incorporates wood, rubber and concrete, built atop the roof of a multi-storey car park. In good weather, the square is a lively meeting place, where you can sit on a bench or at one of the many pavement cafés and enjoy the sunshine.

### 9 // ROTTERDAM SCHOUWBURG

W.G. Quist (1982-1988)

The Schouwburgplein square derives its name from the minimalist, cube-shaped municipal theatre across the way, the Rotterdam Schouwburg. Many shows are produced here every year, varying from classical ballet to experimental multimedia theatre. Vertical loading and unloading is done using the ingenious 'lorry lift' on the outside of the building. The sculptures on the front are by George Rickey; they are designed to move in the wind.

**TIP** Floor Restaurant, located next to the Rotterdam Schouwburg, is a great place to enjoy a deluxe sandwich, a lavish dinner or a drink, for example before or after a show. In the summer, the sunny city garden is a wonderful spot to sit outside.

### 10 // LIJNBAAN

J.H. van den Broek and J.B. Bakema (1953)

Ever since it opened in 1953, Lijnbaan has been the busiest shopping street in the greater Rotterdam area. It was Europe's first pedestrianised shopping area. Nowadays it offers a choice of large stores and small boutiques, with well-known brand names and chains such as Diesel, Tommy Hilfiger, Mango and Invito.

### 11 // STADHUISPLEIN

Stadhuisplein, with its many bars and pavement cafés, is a popular place for both locals and visitors to gather. Situated prominently in the middle of the square, Mari Andriessen's war memorial 'Monument voor de gevallen' consists of two men, a woman and a child (representing the past, present and future). The resistance monument is a tribute to the people of Rotterdam who sacrificed their lives for the liberation of the country during World War II.

**TIP** Drop by at Studio Hergebruik at Coolsingel 53. In this shop, also an exhibition space, you will find work by various artists who renew and recycle materials in interesting ways.

### 12 // CITY HALL

Henri Evers (1912-1920)

On 15 July 1915, Queen Wilhelmina laid the foundation stone for City Hall on Coolsingel, opposite Stadhuisplein. The monumental building has a symmetrical design, constructed around a courtyard, with the main entrance in the middle. The courtyard, laid out as a small park, can be accessed via the street which runs through the middle of City Hall.

### 13 // BEURS/WTC

J.F. Staal (1925-1940) / R.B. van Erk and A.H. Verbeek (1986)

The former stock exchange designed by J.F. Staal, built before the War, was the first building to be restored after the occupation. The World Trade Center, the superstructure of the 90-metre green stock exchange building, dates back to 1986.

**TIP** Take a break, either outside or inside, at pavement café and brasserie Staal. Stylish and always nice and busy, Staal is patronised by businesspeople and shoppers alike.

### 14 // BEURSTRAVERSE

P. de Bruijn (1986-1996), interior by J. Jerde

The Beurstraverse, locally known as the Koopgoot or 'buying trench', runs under Coolsingel. Situated below street level but mostly open to the air, this shopping street has many major chain stores, including HEMA, Zara and H&M. Children just love the water fountains.

### 15 // SCHIELANDSHUIS

J. Lois in collaboration with P. Post (1662-1665)

Just past the corner of the HEMA department store, you now see the oldest building in the city, the Schielandshuis. Named after the Dike Board of Schieland, which moved into the premises in 1665, the Schielandshuis was built in Dutch classic style with baroque details. When Napoleon visited Rotterdam in 1811, he stayed here. The Schielandshuis was painstakingly restored between 1981 and 1985, and now houses the Rotterdam History Museum.

**TIP** Visit the special 'City of Rotterdammers' multimedia exhibition in the Schielandshuis. The story starts in 1880, the point at which Rotterdam began to develop into a metropolis, and it maps out the city's plans for the future.

### 16 // LAURENSKERK

Behind Hoogstraat is the Grote of Sint Laurenskerk (St. Laurens Church), named after the patron saint of the city. The building took on its present form in about 1525, but was hit heavily during the bombing of 14 May 1940. The church was only opened again to the public in 1968. Feel free to look inside, at the beautiful tombstones and the authentic chancel work. In the summer months, all sorts of performances are held on the open-air stage at Grote Kerkplein square in front of the church.

**TIP** The Laurenskerk will be opening a permanent exhibition in 2010 featuring all sorts of interesting facts and stories about the history of the church.

### 17 // DESIDERIUS ERASMUS

Hendrick de Keyser (1622)

This is the oldest statue in the Netherlands! It stands in Grote Kerkplein, just a stone's throw from the Laurenskerk. The philosopher Erasmus was born in Rotterdam around 1468. If you are interested in learning more about Erasmus, feel free to visit the Erasmus House, located just behind the statue.

### 18 // CENTRAL LIBRARY

J. Boot (Van den Broek and Bakema, 1983)

The biggest public library in the Netherlands is located on Binnenrotte. The tiered building has six floors and is truly eye-catching. Take the escalator up and look out over the city through the massive windows. The striking yellow pipes on the outside - which supply fresh air to the building - are reminiscent of the Centre Pompidou in Paris.

**TIP** Every Tuesday and Saturday, Binnenrotte is transformed into the biggest market in Rotterdam. You can find a wide variety of goods here, from fresh vegetables and fish to second-hand shoes and handy tools.

### 19 // MAAGD VAN HOLLAND QUARTER (MAHO)

Come see where the street scene once so characteristic of Rotterdam transformed within a couple of years into a hip, cosmopolitan environment. A wide range of stores, from clothing to furniture, from designer to second-hand, offer something for everyone. MaHo is also the place to be for a drink or bite to eat; you may have a hard time choosing from the variety of coffee bars, pubs, lunchrooms, take-aways and restaurants on offer.

**TIP** The spacious Depot Rotterdam design shop at Pannenkoekstraat 66a sells beautiful classics and contemporary designs. This is also a good place for original designer gifts.

### 20 // BLAAK STATION

H.C.H. Reijnders (1993)

Since it was roofed in, Blaak Station has resembled a flying saucer. The construction is suspended from a massive steel arch decorated with neon lighting in two colours. If the blue light is on, then the train is travelling in the direction of the river. If it is yellow, then the train is heading for the city. Rotterdammers have nicknamed the station 'the teakettle'.

### 21 // CUBE HOUSES

Piet Blom (1978-1984)

Piet Blom was commissioned to create an unusual bridge over the busy access road between Blaak and the Oudehaven harbour. The world-famous result is the Cube Houses, also known as the Blaakse Bos. Each dwelling consists of three floors, with the staircase in the supporting pile. Curious? Then pay a visit to the Kijk-kubus Museum house and

see a cube house from the inside. Soon you'll even be able to spend a night there; Stayokay will be opening a new hostel there in June 2009.

### 22 // OUDEHAVEN (OLD HARBOUR)

Historic ships contrast beautifully with the modern backdrop of the Oudehaven. This is where the first skyscraper in Europe was built in 1898: the White House by architect W. Molenhoek. In summertime, the pavement cafés are packed until late at night. Even when the weather is colder, the Oudehaven is a popular entertainment area with the locals for wining, dining and dancing.

Ossip Zadkine (1951)

This bronze work of art is the city's main war memorial. The hole in the body symbolises how Rotterdam was cut to the heart by the German bombs.

### 24 // MARITIME MUSEUM ROTTERDAM

W.G. Quist (1981-1986)

The oldest maritime museum in the Netherlands. The collection now contains half a million maritime artefacts. Diverse exhibitions can be found here, including Main Port Live, an impressive multimedia presentation of the dynamic port city of Rotterdam. Don't miss the steam ship 'Buffel', which recently reopened its decks to the public following renovations.

### 25 // HARBOUR MUSEUM

The Harbour Museum is a 'working' museum, offering free admission to the public. Ships sail in and out, cranes operate and traditional crafts are demonstrated, so there is always something for the whole family to do here. The Leuvehaven features all kinds of boats and barges, as well as a grain elevator.

**TIP** On Boompjes you walk past the Vlaggenparade, where 230 flags flutter day and night. The flags of all 180 nationalities recognised by the Netherlands are on display here.





## 26 // ERASMUS BRIDGE

*Ben van Berkel (1996)*

The 800-metre long Erasmus Bridge spans the Maas River and links the northern and southern parts of Rotterdam. The suspension bridge has a 159-metre high steel pylon, which is secured with 40 cables. The shape of the pylon gave the bridge its nickname, 'The Swan'. The Erasmus Bridge is the icon of the city of Rotterdam.

### EXTRA WALKING TOUR, KOP VAN ZUID

It is worth your while to deviate from the route here, to enter *Kop van Zuid* via the *Erasmus Bridge*. The *Luxor Theatre* at the foot of the *Erasmus Bridge* regularly presents musicals and other popular shows. The building's red colour and minimalist lines are immediately recognisable. When the *Maastoren* is completed in 2009, a new icon will appear on the Rotterdam horizon. This 165-metre office building will be assuming the status of the highest office building in the Netherlands, taking over the title from the *Nationale Nederlanden tower* in Rotterdam. The former departure and arrival halls of the *Holland-America Line* now house the *Cruise Terminal Rotterdam*, as well as *Café Rotterdam* on the riverbank. The waterfront terrace offers a magnificent view of the *Erasmus Bridge* and the city's skyline. The recently renovated warehouse *Las Palmas* is home to the *Nederlands Fotomuseum*, one of the main centres for photography in the country. The famous *cuisinier Herman den Blijker* has also taken up residence in *Las Palmas*, running a highly popular fish restaurant. On *Koninginnenhoofd* you will find *Hotel New York*, which once served as the head office of the *Holland-America Line*. Today, the nineteenth-century building is a lively bar, restaurant and hotel. Next to *Hotel New York*, the highest residential tower in the Netherlands soars high above the city. The *Montevideo tower* also has various bars and restaurants at ground level. A bit farther to the south, the *ss Rotterdam* lies moored. Following many years of faithful service, this famous steamship is now back in its home port for good. If you would like to take a fun, original break from your walking tour as you continue on your way, then board a water taxi at *Hotel New York* and it will take you to the *Veerhaven*.

## 27 // SCHEEPVAARTKWARTIER

This old district of Rotterdam was once home to the city's shipping companies and port barons. The monumental and often richly adorned premises are a reminder of this period. Nowadays, the shipping offices, trading houses, consulates and government departments alternate with

luxury apartments, restaurants and shops. Many sailing ships are tied up in the charming and authentic *Veerhaven*. On *Willemskade*, you will find the *Wereldmuseum*, which will be opening its doors again in September 2009 following extensive renovations. Sample and savour the atmosphere of the port of Rotterdam with the *Rotterdam Port Experience*, an interactive exploration of the biggest port in Europe.

**TIP** Take a sailing tour on one of the modern *Spido ships* and experience Rotterdam in an unforgettable way from the water.

## 28 // TAX & CUSTOMS MUSEUM

This museum evasns an interesting overview of centuries of smuggling, fraud, tax evasion and failed transactions. Children will enjoy the special smugglers' trip.

## 29 // EUROMAST

*Maaskant (1960)*

The Euromast was designed to mark the *Floriade* in 1960, when the concrete skeleton was built in just 25 days. At the time, the 104-metre tower was the highest in the Netherlands. The narrow *Space Tower* was added ten years later, raising the *Euromast* even higher. The rotating *Euroscope* elevator carries you soaring to the top of the *Euromast*, 185 metres in the air. Located at 100 metres, the restaurant was restyled by top Dutch designer *Jan de Bouvrie* in 2004 and offers the opportunity to enjoy a light or more lavish meal. Dining at such a great height is a truly spectacular experience, with *Rotterdam* at your feet.

**TIP** Do you have what it takes to hang suspended in midair, 100 metres above the streets of Rotterdam? From May to the end of September, daredevils can abseil from the top of the *Euromast Tower*. Or check out the *Discovery Tour*, a multimedia tour featuring all sorts of fun audio and video clips from the city's past and present.

## 26 // ERASMUS BRIDGE / KOP VAN ZUID



### EXTRA WALKING TOUR THROUGH LLOYDKWARTIER

Just across the bridge, you will find yourself in the middle of the bustling *Lloydkwartier*. This part of the city attempts to create the perfect balance between living, working and leisure. Modern houses and offices now line the *Müllerpier*. *Lloyd Multiplein* is a popular venue for all sorts of events, including sports matches on the football and basketball pitches. If it's drama, opera or dance you're looking for, then you'll enjoy the *O.T. Theatre*, where the *Onafhankelijk Toneel* rehearses and performs. The

*Schiecentrale*, the *25KV building* and the trendy multimedia design hotel and restaurant *Stroom* are all housed in a former power station on *Lloydstraat*. This place is referred to as the heart of Rotterdam's creative and audiovisual industry. The eye-catching architectural feature on the *Lloydpier* is the tower of the *Scheepvaart- en Transportcollege school*, designed by *Neutelings Riedijk Architecten*.

## 30 // WESTELIJK HANDELSTERREIN

Renovations on the *Westelijk Handelsterrein* building complex, a listed building dating from 1894, were completed in 2002. The covered warren of shops and restaurants comprises a collection of 36 warehouses lining passageways on two floors. In the same spaces where trade was once conducted, art, entertainment and shopping now go hand in hand. In just a few steps you can move from a gallery to a wine bar, or from a restaurant to a lounge club.

## 31 // KUNSTHAL

*Rem Koolhaas and Fumi Hoshino (1989-1992)*

The *Kunsthall* is one of *Rem Koolhaas's* early designs and a work of art in its own right. About 25 exhibitions a year are held here, presenting culture in the broadest sense of the word: classical art, modern art, design and photography, from elite to popular. A 1992 sculpture by *Henk Visch* graces the roof.

**TIP** Catch your breath and enjoy the quiet and artistic surroundings in the *Kunsthallcafé*.

## 32 // NATURAL HISTORY MUSEUM

*J.F. Metzelaar (1850), E. van Egeraat (1995)*

The *Natural History Museum* can be found in the former villa *Dijkzigt*, which belonged to the shipping family *Van Hoboken*, opposite the *Kunsthall*. One of the more striking features in the museum is the skeleton of a 15-metre sperm whale, which adorns the entrance hall. In 1995, the museum was extended with a modern glass pavilion.

## 33 // MUSEUMPARK

Until just before the Second World War, the *Museumpark* was just a stretch of grass where cattle grazed. One of the first buildings to be erected on the land was *Museum Boijmans Van Beuningen*. This was followed by exclusive villas in the *New Movement* architectural style. Examples of this functionalist, innovative style include *Huis Sonneveld* (1933) by architects *J.A. Brinkman* and *L.C. Van der Vlugt*, who also

designed the *Van Nelle factory* and the current *Chabot Museum*, designed by architects *G.W. Baas* and *L. Stokla*. The *Chabot* was radically renovated in 2008. Work is still being done on the *Museumpark* itself to accommodate a large parking facility underneath the park.

## 34 // MUSEUM BOIJMANS VAN BEUNINGEN

*A. van der Steur (1928-1935) / A. Bodon (1963-1972) / Daem & Robbrecht (2000-2003)*

*Rotterdam's* leading gallery is *Museum Boijmans Van Beuningen*, which houses a large collection of classical and modern art. From *Rembrandt* to *Dali*, *Boijmans* is home to a wide variety of old and new masters. The museum also houses a unique collection of visual art and design. Temporary exhibitions present the innovative work of contemporary artists and designers from the Netherlands and abroad.

## 35 // NETHERLANDS ARCHITECTURE INSTITUTE (NAI)

*Jo Coenen (1993)*

The *NAI* is a must-see for architecture aficionados. The institute houses some 15 temporary exhibitions every year on architecture, urban development and spatial planning. The permanent exhibition '*Living in the Lowlands*' provides a clear overview of developments in Dutch architecture, painting a picture of domestic life in the Netherlands over the past 150 years. The striking sculpture which stands in the water in front of the *NAI* is by the artist *Auke de Vries*, who also designed the *Maasbeeld sculpture* (nicknamed 'the washing line') near the *Willems Bridge*. An admission ticket for the *NAI* is also valid for *Huis Sonneveld* (see *Museumpark*), which offers an interesting audio tour.

*Sylvette*, on the corner near *Boijmans Van Beuningen*, is a sculpture created jointly by *Carl Nesjar* and *Pablo Picasso*. *Picasso* had his small sculpture enlarged using a technique developed by *Nesjar*. *Sylvette* was a woman who *Picasso* admired in the period around 1958.

## 37 // WITTE DE WITHSTRAAT

From casino to art gallery, from criminal to artist. This encapsulates the incredible metamorphosis of *Witte de Withstraat*, today the street of art and culture in *Rotterdam*. You can easily spend a whole day wander-

ring around there, from museum to gallery, to shop, to bar. The many bars, which usually stay open until late, are very popular with the locals.

**TIP** Meet every nationality living in Rotterdam at the fantastic *Bazar* eatery, which is always busy and has a great atmosphere. It serves tasty and affordable North African cuisine.

## 38 // WITTE DE WITH AND TENT.

Two centres of contemporary art are located in the same building: *TENT* on the ground floor and *Witte de With* on the floors above. *Witte de With* explores the latest trends in art and is not afraid to venture outside the traditional circuit. *TENT* is very Rotterdam: international, contemporary, risky and dynamic.

## 39 // WESTBLAAK SKATEPARK

One of the best skateparks in the Netherlands is on *Westblaak*. Everything is made of stainless steel. The brightly coloured lines on the smooth asphalt add extra dynamism to the skaters' moves.

## 40 // WESTERSINGEL

In 1859, *Westersingel* was constructed as part of a water project, mainly to enhance the water management and improve hygiene in the old city. Most of the buildings in *Westersingel*, *Eendrachtsweg* and *Mauritsweg* date from the nineteenth century and were designed for the upper class. *Westersingel* forms part of the city's cultural axis. A section of it is on the sculpture route, featuring work by major sculptors such as *Rodin*, *Carel Visser*, *Joel Shapiro* en *Umberto Boccioni*.

## 41 // CAFÉ DE UNIE

*J.J.P. Oud (1925)*

Before the bombing of May 1940, *Café De Unie* (1925) was on *Coolsingel*. Its replica was built on *Westersingel* in 1986. The bar, restaurant and cultural centre were designed by architect *J.J.P. Oud*; you can't miss it among the nineteenth-century buildings. The front of the building, covered in shapes in the primary colours blue, yellow and red, is characteristic of *De Stijl* school of architecture from the 1930s.

## 42 // WEST-KRUISKADE

Come to the best multicultural street in the Netherlands for something different than your average Dutch shopping centre. At the beginning of *West-Kruiskade* you will find *Rotterdam's Chinatown*, with its Chinese supermarkets and authentic restaurants. Further along the road, shops sell embroidered silks, gold sold by the ounce, Japanese pottery for next to nothing, carp in aquariums, American streetwear and Turkish and Moroccan delicacies. This part of the city is home to more than 150 nationalities, so it's a great place to encounter the whole world. If you're looking for a fun night out, check out the world's first sustainable dance club at *WATT*.

*Rotterdam* is a young international city on the water, which will amaze and inspire you. *Rotterdam's* skyline is expanding and changing all the time, because they aren't afraid to take risks here when it comes to rebuilding! This brochure will guide you past the many architectural and cultural tours de force and provide you with some surprising tips.
